


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



### **NC Community College Enrollment** for Cherokee County, Fall 2023








### **FAFSA Completion**

44% of Cherokee County high school seniors complete the FAFSA, below the rural - non-metro county average of 54%.

**44.1%** of 2024 high school class **completed the FAFSA** as of Sept. 27, 2024. 80 more need to complete in 2024 to meet state goal of **80%**. **Peer:** 54.0% | **State:** 55.0%

### Post High School Graduation Intentions





### **NC Pre-K Enrollment**

61% of Cherokee County eligible 4-year-olds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the rural - non-metro county average of 71%

**60.6%** of eligible 4-year-olds **enrolled in NC Pre-K program** in 2024, 14 more needed to meet state goal of **75%**. **Peer:** 71.0% | **State:** 57.2%

### **Cherokee County Traditional Public Schools students:**

28.3% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in reading in 2024. 587 more needed to meet state goal of 73%.

Peer: 24.5% | State: 29.8%

**30.7%** of 3-8 graders **earned college-and-career-ready scores in math** in 2024. 726 more needed to meet state goal of **86%**. **Peer:** 30.3% | **State:** 36.5%

**36.5%** of students were **chronically absent from school** in 2023, 805 less needed to meet state goal of **11%**. **Peer:** 29.3% | **State:** 27.5%



Cherokee County has a **student-to-school counselor ratio** of **207:1** compared to **332:1** in peer counties, 2024

### Pathways to College and Career

Students in traditional public schools completed 1,217 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials and 143 concentrations. 338 (27.8%) of credentials were industry-valued in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations: Human Services; Business Management & Administration; and Health Science.



**33** (<5%) high school students took at least one **AP, IB, or CIE exam. State:** 16.8% (2023).


